A couple of highlights this month: firstly, we are delighted to announce the completion of the refurbishment of our historic Burn-Jones stained-glass windows (see some of the pictures in Abi's article opposite). Secondly, we are excited to host the next in our new series of Music Evenings on 21st April with Undercover2 — tattie supper included — so don't miss out. Finally, let me wish you a Happy Easter, and don't eat too many eggs!

Pear & Gingerbread Cake (thanks to Jamie Oliver)

4 large eggs
200ml olive oil
200g dark brown
sugar
200g self raising
flour
1 teaspoon baking
powder
200g ground
almonds
100g 70% dark

chocolate



100g stem ginger in syrup410g tin pear halves in juice

Preheat oven to 180C. Prepare a 20x30cm roasting tin, grease with olive oil, line with a sheet of damp greaseproof paper.

Crack the eggs into a large bowl, whisk with the sugar and olive oil, fold in the flour, baking powder and ground almonds. Finely chop half the chocolate and all the ginger and fold through the batter. Pour into the tray. Drain the pears reserving half the juice, slice lengthways and arrange on top, poking them into the batter.

Bake for 35mins or until an inserted skewer comes out clean. Leave to cool in the tin for 5mins, transfer to wire rack, carefully removing the paper.

Bring to the boil the reserved pear juice, a drizzle of ginger syrup, turn the heat off and break in the remaining chocolate and stir to make a simple chocolate sauce.

Drizzle over the cake and serve.

For our April meeting we will be discussing Home Going by Yaa Gyasi which I'm sure will prove be an emotional and memorable read.

Homegoing is a multigenerational saga that follows the descendants of two half sisters, Effia and Esi, across three centuries, beginning in eighteenthcentury Ghana and arriving



at the present day. The sisters grow up knowing nothing of the other, one to the Asante tribe and the other to the Fante tribe on the Gold Coast. Both are given a black stone necklace, to be passed down to the next generation.

The narrative takes several paths from these women - the generations that follow their legacy always bringing each person home to their roots of who they are and where they came from.

Activities include walking, campfire, silent disco and much more. We will be planning and leading worship inside the Barn.

The Barn is in the small village of Flagg about 6 miles south of Buxton and 6 miles west of Bakewell. Flagg is close to the Limestone Way and at the centre of a network of paths criss-crossing this part of the Peak District. There are great opportunities for walking, cycling, visiting places of interest or just relaxing in the peaceful surroundings. The Barn at Flagg is a simple bunk barn with a large adjacent camping field having terrific views over open countryside. Set in the White Peak area of Derbyshire the barn sleeps nine people in two dorm rooms with living areas downstairs that can seat 26 people.

There is a large kitchen, living area, toilets and showers. All young people will be accommodated inside the Barn (in bunks) or in tents in the field just outside.

There will be 5 staff looking after the young people, 2 of whom will provide catering for the group.

All staff have a current enhanced DBS check which has been sourced by the Unitarian College – specific to the event.

Young people will be accommodated in same-sex bunk rooms or same-sex tents.
